The Kids First Fund 2014 ANNUAL REPORT

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From the President

This year's letter will not dwell on a big central theme, nor spend much time on the events of 2014. Instead, as this organization moves into its 16th year, I wish to write about our future.

According to the things that can be measured by numbers, the 15th year of the Kids First Fund was very productive. Fundraising from all sources, such as individual donations and the annual online travel auction, generated more than \$20,000. This allowed us to end the year with a healthy balance statement showing total assets in excess of \$100,000. When combined with our activities in Moldova and Latvia, the business of the Kids First Fund was responsibly conducted while reaching or helping thousands of children, parents, and those in child protection professions.

We added two talented and motivated board members during 2014. Doug Mullen lives in Washington DC and is the Assistant General Counsel for Airlines for America, which is one of the world's premier airline trade associations. Indra Petersons, who most recently the weather anchor of CNN's morning show "New Day," has a mother and father who were born in Latvia. You are invited to learn more about them later in this report.

But beyond these developments, I had a nagging feeling we could be doing much more. I am very pleased by the results of the work done by the Child Rights Information Center, our partner organization in Moldova. However, our activities in Latvia would benefit from identifying a new initiative to embrace. Meanwhile at home, our website has grown tired from a lack of attention and our ability to cultivate individual donors was failing. We can do better and we will.

Your board of directors intends to improve the Kids First Fund during 2015. I am happy to share the following initiatives with you:

- Stuart Benzal, a board member since our founding in 1999, has become our Chief Marketing Officer and his volunteer efforts will lead programs to increase donations from our website and by the personal solicitations of our board members.
- The development of a membership club to permit a new group of potential supporters to donate a modest amount to receive a small package of benefits. Awareness for this campaign will be created through the Adwords account generously donated by Google.

- KidsFirstFund.org will be updated with a new appearance and feature more images related to the work and good that we do. Our good friend, Matthew Frederick, will lead this redesign and implementation. I thank Matthew for supporting our website for many years and donating hosting for the site.
- The grantmaking process for a new project in Latvia will be completed. This will result in the selection of a partner organization to provide child abuse prevention services based upon the successful model we support in Moldova.

This last item will be our big news for 2015. Similar to Moldova, we will provide annual grants of \$15,000 for school-based child abuse prevention education in impoverished rural areas of Latvia.

The 2014 annual report represents a continuing commitment to donor disclosure by including the annual financial statements for the Kids First Fund. In addition, filings made with government regulators, such as the US Internal Revenue Service, are available for download at KidsFirstFund.org.

Revenue from donations and the travel auction represent the engine of our good works. Annual cash contributions have largely ranged between \$6,000 and \$9,000 for the 2007 through 2014 period, as shown in the table below:

Cash contributions for 2014 fell by almost half from the prior year amount due to several factors. Results for 2013 were boosted by a single \$10,000 contribution that year. Results from the annual travel auction fell due to troubles caused by a single bidder on eBay. His actions prompted us to remove several high value items from the auction to prevent further troubles faced by one of our donor airlines.

Two significant cash distributions were made to fund our program in Moldova; no distributions were made to Latvia. The board authorized two \$7,500 grants for ongoing support of the child abuse prevention project operated by the Child Rights Information Center in Moldova. The Kids First Fund provided \$15,000 during 2014 for spring and fall programs in rural regions of the country. Additional details for the Moldova project are provided in this report.

The Kids First Fund continued its tradition of operating on a zero-overhead budget and did not incur expenses related to salaries, fundraising fees, and travel. Our cash and investments balance at year-end was \$100,687. The Kids First Fund anticipates it will provide \$15,000 to support a full year of work in Moldova during 2015 in addition to \$15,000 for a new project in Latvia. The financial statements were drafted by Bob Bahlman, treasurer of the Kids First Fund.

Latvia Family Shelter Helps Record Number of Children

The Latgale Regional Support Centre

for Abused Children and Women, known as Rasas Perles (Pearls of Dew), provided support to a record number of children during 2014. This follows four years of increased activity.

The shelter continues to implement a multidiscipline approach to helping children recover from child abuse. Children are placed here after a referral has been made by a government agency. Sometimes the mother, who also may be a victim of abuse, is placed with the child. Financial support associated with these placements comes from a combination of national and municipal sources, along with the general program support

provided by private donations, corporations, charities, and EU governments. The allocated budget for 2014 was \in 249,565 (US \$284,000); actual expenditures were higher at \in 259,414 (US \$296,000).

The multidiscipline approach relies upon a curriculum of care developed for each child. Children and mothers benefit from regular psychological consultations during the prescribed 30- or 60-day stays permitted by government support. The shelter strives to provide the following benefits to every person receiving assistance:

- Teach children and mothers elementary skills of interpersonal communication.
- Provide access to healthy living activities in the kitchen, woodworking room, and gym.
- Identify resources and alternatives for mothers when they encounter difficult situations.

- Learn and practice the definition of socially acceptable behavior.
- Build confidence for mothers in their role as caregiver and protector.
- Create recreational and sporting events for children to build self-confidence and healthy interpersonal interaction.

The shelter has a variety of places in which these activities can occur, including the vegetable gardens, greenhouse, instructional kitchen, and woodworking shop.

Overall the shelter strives to increase the capability for families to build trust and cooperation as methods to eliminate violence in the home.

The shelter began a new initiative during 2014 which will continue through the end of 2015. Thanks to support from the governments of Iceland, Lichtenstein, and Norway, the shelter received funds of nearly \in 50,000. The project is designed to decrease domestic abuse by identifying victims and those who commit abuse. These families will receive extensive rehabilitation attention with the objective of creating functional and harmonious families. The program is designed to leave a framework for helping families affected by domestic abuse in the Latgale district of Latvia.

Year-Over-Year Results Nearly Double the Number of Teachers, Parents, and Children Benefitting from Training in Moldova

The Kids First Fund and its Moldova-based partner, the Child Rights Information Center Moldova (CRIC), began its fifth year of cooperation during 2014. CRIC operated the Child Abuse Awareness and Prevention Project with 100 percent of grant support provided by the Kids First Fund. The initial three-year project concluded during the first half of 2013 and was extended by the Kids First Fund Board for an additional three years through 2016. To date, this program has reached participants in 26 of 41 Modolva's districts or municipalities, reached more than 32,525 participants, and achieved a near doubling of year-over-year participation.

The project reaches three groups with a broad array of topics related to child abuse and abandonment. The first step takes a "train the trainer" approach through two-day seminars with teachers, school professionals, and social workers as participants. This group is encouraged to share knowledge and experience with two additional groups: parents and students.

The seminars use a variety of activities to deliver and reinforce the educational message: brainstorming, individual reflections, small group exercises, viewing and discussing videos, and role playing. Participants are provided a take-home library of publications, most of which are proprietary works created by CRIC specifically for the seminar. Publications include training support materials for preventing violence in schools such as child-focused cartoons for resolving conflicts between friends, brochures defining the rights of children, and multiple books addressing Moldova's problem of parents working abroad.

The design of this program provides a cascading effect by reaching thousands of parents and children. During 2014, a core group of 220 teachers, school administrators and psychologists (representing 141 schools) received the full two-day training. The benefit of past training activity throughout Moldova now significantly multiplies the number of educational professionals, children, and parents reached countrywide.

Training in Moldova continued

The final layer of awareness-building engaged more than 12,235 children and 3,206 parents and caregivers during 2014. This network relies upon volunteer activity, which will affect the quality of self-reporting of statistics provided by trainers to CRIC.

Feedback provided by those receiving training, such as teachers, demonstrates why the need is so great. Most teachers are not aware of the child protection system and their obligation to act in the best interest of the child. Before training occurs, they are not able to identify the skills they should pass to their students on how to prevent violence. Few teachers know how to report suspected cases of abuse against children, even though this is required by national legislation. Sadly, little collaboration exists between educators and social services in communities. Reliance upon a multidisciplinary approach, which relies upon a variety of professionals, to serve the needs of abused children is virtually non-existent. The entire training experience is designed to change this situation in Moldova, district by district.

The project continues to deliver very meaningful results at a modest cost. More than 32,500 participants have been reached at a very efficient cost of \$1.61 per person since the project began in 2010. The statistics provided here define the audience reached directly by teachers interacting with parents and students. Of course, there is a wider audience in each community that benefits from the awareness-building and behavioral changes generated by the core group of teachers and parents.

Topbonus, Southwest and Tune Hotels Receive Kids First Teddy Bear Awards

The Kids First Fund recognized the top performers of the 2014 International Online Travel Auction for Kids. Although many airlines and hotel brands generously donate to the Fund, the awards are given to the three highest performers in the auction each year. The 2014 awards were presented on the evening of November 18, 2014 and honored:

- Topbonus donated packages totaling 400,000 frequent flier miles, to redeem on airberlin and program partners such as Etihad Airways, generated over \$3,700 in total bids more than any other single corporate donor.
- Southwest Airlines provided six unrestricted tickets that generated the second highest bid activity, which was in excess of \$3,600.
- Tune Hotels generously provided 25 two night stay hotel accommodations at various Tune locations in London and Edinburgh, Scotland. These generated the third highest bid activity for any single donor company, bringing in \$2,200.

Topbonus, Southwest and Tune Hotels each received a Kids First Teddy Bear Award in recognition of their support for this year's auction. Each bear has been custom crafted by the Vermont Teddy Bear Company with the logo of the Kids First Fund and a sash recognizing the recipient company.

The recognition event occurred during the MEGA Awards Gala on November 18, 2014 in New Orleans, Louisiana and was associated with a global airline industry conference hosted by Airline Information. Jonathan Clarkson, Director of Rapid Rewards, received the Kids First Teddy Bear Awards on behalf of Southwest Airlines.

New to 2014 auction was a FlyerTalk auction page with unique items such as mileage vouchers from Delta SkyMiles and airberlin topbonus. FlyerTalk is one of the most popular online communities frequented by business travelers who are passionate about all things travel-related. The community includes over 200 forums with more than seven million posts discussing airline, hotel, credit card, and phone and rental car companies.
